





### OHIO PRIVATE-SECTOR EMPLOYMENT (MILLIONS)


#### YEAR-TO-YEAR (DECEMBER TO DECEMBER) CHANGE IN JOBS IN OHIO, IN THOUSANDS

NOTES: Though Oklahoma, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Kentucky, and West Virginia appear as Right-to-Work states, their data are a combination of both Right-to-Work and Forced-Unionization data. Oklahoma, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, West Virginia, and Kentucky became Right-to-Work states in 2001, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2016, and 2017, respectively. Missouri became a Right-to-Work state in 2017 but returned to Forced-Unionization in 2018. Michigan repealed its 2012 Right-to-Work law in April 2023.
